MR. MANDLER: Your Honor, I'd like to either now or sometime soon revisit an issue that I brought up at our first pretrial three weeks ago, which is how we're allotting time among the parties.

THE COURT: How what?

MR. MANDLER: Allotting time among the parties.

If I can, Your Honor. I charted out the time based on the video depositions that have been disclosed and discussed and fought over as long as there -- as well as the rest of the live witnesses making some pretty conservative estimates on time for live witnesses given that our first witness was on the stand for over a day and a half.

And right now the Plaintiffs will take until the end of next week, which is two of our three weeks. I think that would be giving only two days each for Monsanto and BASF.

I think we need to consider somehow are we going to cut these videos or how we're going to limit the number of them, because if you don't put any limits on what the Plaintiffs are doing, this is going to be a five- or six-week

trial, or it's going to be unfair, and we're going to get 1 2 pressed for time at the end of the case. 3 THE COURT: Well, I'm going to make sure that 4 doesn't happen, because -- go ahead. 5 MR. RANDLES: Well, what Plaintiffs (sic) are doing 6 is a little misleading. I'm not sure there's a single video 7 where our designations make up the majority, is there? 8 MS. GEORGE: For the BASF case against them I 9 designated three hours and 24 minutes to put on our entire 10 case against them. They have counter-designated, and with 11 rebuttals I can do their whole case in half a day. 12 THE COURT: I did notice that a lot of the 13 testimony from the live witness was defense evidence. 14 MR. MANDLER: I was up here for three minutes, Your 15 Honor. 16 THE COURT: Well, yeah, I mean, but at least 17 So but they're not going to have to recall that Monsanto. 18 particular witness to great lengths at least. 19 MS. MILLER: I don't think we're going to have to 20 recall him at all, Your Honor. 21 THE COURT: I was hoping that. 22 But I think the only thing I can tell you is that 23 we're going to go as long as it takes, and I'll make sure 24 everybody gets their say in this case whatever you need to do

with calling witnesses or introducing evidence whatever it

is.

I'm having to move all my dockets too, but we need to get this case completed. It's as simple as that. But, on the other hand, anything all of you can do to help expedite things we really need to, because -- and you've made some progress last night apparently, so I appreciate that.

MR. RANDLES: And that's actually what Mr. Miller and I were discussing during not the last break, but the first break this afternoon. I've been discussing it with Ms. George.

We have some ideas based on what's already come in through the live witnesses, which I think was more than we expected on both sides, and trying to avoid duplication.

So people will be meeting on that. People will be trying to trim that down. I hope Mr. Mandler's estimate is pessimistic. I hope it is. And I think it is.

THE COURT: Okay. I may have to -- I don't know what I'm going to do. Okay. We're adjourned for the day then.
