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## TRIAL

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The trial resumed on Tuesday, the 4th day of February, 2020, before the Honorable Stephen N. Limbaugh, United States District Judge, of the Eastern District of Missouri, Southeastern Division, before a jury and two alternate jurors, who were impaneled, selected and sworn.

(Proceedings resumed in open court outside the presence of the jury.)

THE COURT: Good morning.

MR. MILLER: Good morning.

MR. MANDLER: Good morning, Your Honor.

THE COURT: So any preliminary matters?

MR. MANDLER: At your pleasure, Your Honor, at some time today we are going to raise an issue about a fourth amended or third amended supplemental exhibit list that was filed this week.

In addition, if we're going to go to Birk, I'd probably want to pass out the Birk, Your Honor, our formal objections before we get rolling.

MS. GEORGE: We're going to start with Borgmeyer and then Birk.

MR. MANDLER: Are you going to start with Borgmeyer?

MS. GEORGE: So if you want to pass it out now you

1 can. 2 MR. MANDLER: Well, I can do both of them if you 3 want. 4 MS. GEORGE: Whatever you prefer. 5 Your Honor, we have a video that will get us until 6 about 10:15, and then maybe a break. And then if we could do 7 another hour, hour and a half with lunch. Then we'll still 8 have another hour, hour and a half. And then Bill Bader 9 could go on after that to start the live witnesses. 10 THE COURT: Oh, really, live witnesses? 11 MS. And I'm not -- this doesn't apply 20 to demonstratives. I understand during trial you're going to 21 disclose each other's, you know, demonstratives. These are actual exhibits that we've had no ability 22 23 to, you know, know that they were coming in. We may have had 24 a witness who knows about it over the past month, but to do

it in the middle of trial, Your Honor, is just too late and

too inappropriate under the rules.

THE COURT: I don't have any idea what these exhibits are.

Do you want to address that?

MR. MANDLER: Our position is regardless of what they are. And I haven't spend a lot of time looking at them. It's too late.

MR. RANDLES: Well, Your Honor, this isn't the only supplemental exhibit list filed by anybody. We've had several filed in this case. Our fourth list are -- is composed of eight Missouri Department of Ago investigations, which are in response to the investigation files Monsanto used in opening that I objected to.

We've got six photos of Dr. Baldwin, which I intend to use with him that they have had in discovery for the whole time. And there's a massive amount of photos here, Your Honor, so selecting the exact ones is difficult, but that's what those are.

And those are the only ones on this list other than the demonstratives intended to be used in our case. The rest of these are going to be used in cross or impeachment anyway, so they don't need to be on the list anyway, but we went ahead --

THE COURT: That's right.

MR. RANDLES: So we went ahead and just numbered

them out of abundance of caution.

There are six BASF documents we found during a review for Hornberger, Murray and Pace, which we talked at in some detail that -- when we objected to those witnesses. We asked for the custodial files. Mr. Mandler said can't be done. He said there are 2,600 or 3,600 -- I don't remember the number -- relative to these people, and you said, Well, can't you search for them? So we searched for them. And we found some and put it on the list. But, again, I don't intend to insert those into our case. They're going to be cross or impeachment, obviously.

THE COURT: Well, can you whittle the list down to the ones from the 20 he's got on his list so that I can evaluate them separately?

MR. RANDLES: I believe the only ones that we intend to use in our case are six Ford Baldwin photos of just damage at Bader Farms, which, again, had been produced, but I don't think all of them had -- or had been marked as an exhibit on a prior list.

THE COURT: So six photos, that's the only part of the 20 -- listed 20 that you had down other than on cross, or something like that then, huh?

MR. RANDLES: That's my understanding.

THE COURT: Why did you even list those if you didn't need to?

1 MR. RANDLES: Those I'm going to use with Dr. 2 Bal dwi n. So those --3 THE COURT: The six? 4 MR. RANDLES: Yes, sir. I need to list those. 5 THE COURT: Well, I mean, the six photographs --6 Dr. Baldwin has been in the case since day one, and so it 7 seems like you should have disclosed those. 8 MR. RANDLES: We have disclosed those. We've 9 produced mountains of photos to them, and they've produced 10 mountains of photos back to us. 11 THE COURT: Oh, no, but, I mean, as part of the 12 trial exhibit list so that they could register objections. 13 MR. RANDLES: Again, I don't think there are going 14 to be any objections. I mean, I'll lay the proper 15 foundation. They're photos of the trees and surrounding 16 vegetation. I mean, these have all been covered in the 17 depositions. 18 MR. MANDLER: Well, Your Honor, why have an exhibit 19 list at all then if we're just going to be able to pick the 20 exhibits from the 1.5 million that have been produced and try 21 them out whenever somebody comes in? 22 The whole point of having an exhibit list is to 23 have this go in an orderly fashion. You can't amend it four 24 weeks -- or one and a half weeks into trial.

MR. RANDLES:

That was my question about your

1 exhibit list too well after the deadline -- a witness list, 2 but that was okay apparently. 3 MR. MANDLER: It was. 4 MR. RANDLES: And that had three -- four new witnesses in trial that weren't disclosed before in a timely 5 6 fashion, so I think six photos is hardly a stretch. 7 MR. MANDLER: That's not an analogy. We met the 8 deadline with our exhibit list, Your Honor. This is a week 9 into trial. It will be as if I gave you my exhibit list 10 yesterday, which is what you did with your witness -- with 11 your exhibit list. 12 THE COURT: And this was -- when was this fourth 13 exhibit list filed? 14 MR. MANDLER: It was originally due on 15 December 20th. It was filed on February 2nd, again, Sunday. I think I will grant as 16 THE COURT: Yeah. Okay. 17 to those six photographs then, because they should have been 18 on the list a long time ago. So they're entitled to know 19 what photographs that you're going to introduce so that they 20 can prepare a defense. So --21 MR. RANDLES: Well, I will make those a proffer. 22 THE COURT: Okay. We'll be in recess until 1:10. 23
